

Vending By-law Summary

General Rules

- You can't sell stuff on private property, streets, sidewalks, or town areas without a license.
- The license is for a specific person or business and can't be transferred.
- Apply for a license through the By-law Enforcement Office. They decide whether to approve it within 30 days.
- If you break the rules, the By-law Enforcement Office can take away your license.

Applying for a License

- Fill out a Vending Application form and submit it to the By-law Enforcement Office.
- Include details like where you'll sell, permission letters if needed, your contact info, vehicle details, what you're selling, insurance proof, power sources, and pictures/drawings of your setup.
- The By-law Enforcement Office will check if your location is suitable, safe, and clean.

Auctioneers

- You can't sell stuff at a public auction without a license.
- There are exceptions for legal processes like sheriffs or people selling due to rent issues.

License Details

- Vending licenses are valid for one year.
- Fees are as per the Town's Municipal User Fees Policy.

Rules for Vendors

- Get permission to vend on private property.
- Display your license during operation.
- Follow specific distance rules from other businesses and residential areas.
- Keep your vending area clean and dispose of trash properly.
- Follow safety and noise rules.
- Park correctly when stopping to vend.
- Have all necessary permits to operate.

Exemptions (No License Needed)

- Non-profit car wash or vehicle cleaning for fundraising.
- Neighbourhood or residential yard sales.
- Activities linked to certain events and markets.
- Town-sanctioned community events.
- School or university fundraising in the Town or County.
- Non-profit organizations carrying out fundraising.
- Religious groups with assessed property in the Town.

Offenses and Penalties

- The By-law Enforcement Officer enforces the rules.
- It's an offense to do business without a license or break the rules.
- Offenders can lose their license and pay a \$410 penalty for each offense.

Appeals

- If your license is refused or revoked, you'll be told why in writing.
- You can appeal to the Police and License Committee within 15 days, stating your reasons.
- The Committee can uphold or overturn the decision, and Council may review the appeal as well.
